ARTICLE: Sexual Assault Now Tried Outside Military Chain of Command

EXCERPT: Beginning today, the decision to prosecute sexual assault and several other serious crimes has moved from an accused service member's chain of command to new Offices of Special Trial Counsel, which have general or flag officer leaders who report directly to the secretaries of the military departments.

ARTICLE: US and Chilean Navies Strengthen Interoperability with Naval Exercise

EXCERPT: With the aim of increasing interoperability, readiness, and strengthening ties of friendship and cooperation, the navies of the United States and Chile completed a new edition of naval exercise Teamwork South, October 6-12, between the regions of Coquimbo and Valparaíso, in central Chile. ... A Women, Peace, and Security panel was also carried out on board the frigate Lynch, the Chilean Navy said, adding that the naval institution has processes for the incorporation of women in different areas, including the entry of the first female cadets to the Naval School in 2007.

ARTICLE: A Global Commitment to End All Gender-Based Violence

EXCERPT: We have seen time and again that the risk and incidence of GBV increase during conflict. In Afghanistan, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia, Iran, South Sudan, Sudan, Ukraine, Yemen—in every region—women and girls are raped, sexually assaulted, subjected to domestic and intimate partner violence, and trafficked. Conflict-related sexual violence (CRSV), a form of GBV constituting incidents or patterns of sexual violence occurring in conflict or post-conflict settings with a direct or indirect link to conflict, can be an early warning sign for the onset of atrocities and an atrocity itself. The current crisis in the Middle East is front of mind for many of us.

ARTICLE: New Global Health & Gender Policy Brief: Women and Girls in Wartime

EXCERPT: The world is currently bearing witness to a surge of ongoing conflicts, each with complex geopolitical, socioeconomic, and cultural factors, which contribute to their continuation and intractability. The impact on women is clear. In 2022, some 600,000,000 women lived within 50 kilometers of armed conflict. Evidence shows that armed conflict increases the risk of gender-based violence (GBV) and maternal deaths, decreases girls' attendance in school and women's participation in

the paid economy, and has led to the displacement of more than 40 million women and children. GBV is even more prevalent among women and girls who have been forcibly displaced.

Gender equality improved during and after the Revolution of Dignity (a.k.a. the Euromaidan Protests) of 2013–2014. During this and other historical events, Ukrainian women played an important role in fighting for freedom, equality, and dignity. Grassroots activism has a long tradition in Ukraine, and women have actively participated in bringing forth "bottom-up" changes in the country, including new ideas about gender.

ARTICLE: Congress Tells Army to Set Higher Fitness Standards for Combat Arms Soldiers REPORTER: By Steve Beynon, Military.com (12.07.23)

EXCERPT: Congress is set to direct the Army to boost fitness standards for most combat-arms jobs through a compromise defense policy bill unveiled Wednesday.

The must-pass National Defense Authorization Act, or NDAA, which sets funding and policy priorities for the Pentagon, directs the service to increase the baseline standards in the Army Combat Fitness Test, or ACFT, for ground troops including infantry, cavalry scouts and Special Forces within 18 months of the bill

being signed into law by the president. ... The NDAA does not prescribe the new standards to be gender neutral, an about-face from what a draft version of the House version of the bill called for and what some Army planners were mulling behind the scenes.

ARTICLE: How the Taliban Enables Violence Against Women

EXCERPT: In just 28 months, the Taliban have dismantled Afghan women's and girls' rights — imposing draconian restrictions regarding their education, employment and freedom of movement. Any perceived violation of these oppressive policies is often met with harassment, intimidation, and verbal and physical abuse orchestrated by the Taliban's Ministry of Vice and Virtue. And when women are detained by authorities, they have been subjected to cruel treatment, including torture. The Taliban's anti-women policies, combined with an emboldened patriarchal system, have made Afghanistan the lowest-ranked country in the 2023 Women, Peace and Security Index.

ARTICLE: U.S. Commitments at the 2023 Accra Peacekeeping Ministerial

EXCERPT: To continue our robust and longstanding peacekeeping capacity-building efforts, address UN Action for Peacekeeping priorities, and support ambitious action globally, on December 6, 2023, the United States pledged to 1) Operationalize our Commitment to Women, Peace, and Security Objectives through the Establishment of a New Partnership to Implement a Women's Body Armor Pilot Project. The United States continues to prioritize and undertake initiatives that promote the full, equal, and meaningful participation and operational imperative of women in peacekeeping. In recognition of Ghana's and Zambia's leadership in expanding the meaningful participation of women in UN peacekeeping deployments, the United States, the Netherlands, Ghana, and Zambia are partnering on a quadrilateral women's body armor pilot program.

ARTICLE: Sexual Violence is Not an Inevitable Cost of War

EXCERPT: The ever-growing list of conflict zones in which sexual violence has been reported globally this year, including in Israel, Ethiopia, Sudan, Ukraine, the Democratic Republic of Congo and Haiti, underscores the persistent horror of this scourge. Acts of conflict-related sexual violence (CRSV) violate not only the physical and mental integrity of the victims but also breach international humanitarian law and human rights principles. The consequences extend beyond the immediate trauma, impacting individuals, families, communities and countries for years, even decades, afterward.

ARTICLE: Short Changed: Military Women Face Assault, Harassment, Death. Is Culture to Blame? REPORTER: By Kristin Davis, The War Horse (12.07.23)

EXCERPT: "Can culture change? Yes," said John Kotter, a Harvard Business School's Konosuke Matsushita professor of leadership, emeritus, who has written extensively on organizational change. "The bigger the operation in general, the more slowly it changes. There's no question about that. You've got so many people who have got to change their norms and behaviors." ... It takes work—recognizing those who made the change, and applauding and communicating the results, Kotter said. But it can be done, even in the largest organizations. And while change doesn't have to start at the top, those at the top can stymie it "if they are strong enough and powerful enough." In successful cases, though, "at a certain point there is enough evidence, energy, and enthusiasm around this new way of operating," he said. "At a minimum [leaders] don't block it. In the best cases, they become champions."

ARTICLE: Weapon or Tool? How the Tech Community Can Shape Robust Standards and Norms for AI, Gender, and Peacebuilding

EXCERPT: In October, following earlier remarks that artificial intelligence (AI) poses "enormous potential and enormous danger," President Biden issued a sprawling executive order (EO) on the technology. The EO establishes a White House AI Council and tasks agencies with forming guidelines for the safe use of AI, from disinformation to cybersecurity. While the Gender Policy Council—established by President

Biden in 2021 to advance gender equity and equality in US domestic and foreign policy—is included in the AI Council, the EO fails to mention gender, violence, or conflict in relation to AI best practices. The international community lacks standards and norms to ensure that AI contributes to gender equality and builds sustainable peace. Evidence shows that digital technologies can drive gendered violence and violent conflict.

EXCERPT: Since being founded in 1946, the Hawaii Air National Guard continues to make strides towards equality at all levels of leadership, perpetuated by its most recent change of command in the 154th Security Forces Squadron. Maj. Allison Delos Santos became the first female to receive the guidon of the 154th Security Forces Squadron, accepting the role of its commander Dec. 1, 2023. In the military where women are on average outnumbered by their male counterparts by a ratio of 5-1, the women leaders of the Hawaii Air National Guard are blazing their trails along the way.

ARTICLE: Sky Soldier Makes History as First Active Duty Female Army Sniper

EXCERPT: "My nickname growing up was 'Sniper,'" said U.S. Army Sgt. Maciel Hay, a cavalry scout with 1st Squadron, 91st Cavalry Regiment (1-91 CAV), 173rd Airborne Brigade.

Not only did she make it through basic training while qualifying as an expert with the M4 assault rifle, she quickly followed that up by graduating from airborne school. Now she is truly living up to her childhood nickname as the first active duty female U.S. Army sniper. Prior to Hay's accomplishment, only a female National Guardsman from Montana had completed the course.

ARTICLE: Women, Peace, Security: Thinking Creatively to Pursue National Security Through Gender Equality

EXCERPT: Twenty-three years after the U.N. Security Council passed the Women, Peace, and Security framework and six years after the United States became the only country to legislatively mandate its implementation, widespread misunderstanding remains about why it matters to national security. Contrary to what is sometimes heard among U.S. security practitioners in classrooms, conferences, and conversations, this is not a social justice program. It is not a diversity, equity, and inclusion mandate, or a call for the government to "do the right thing." And regardless of what the name might make you think, it is not just about women.

ARTICLE: Women's Bazaar Brings Together AB 201, Local Community

EXCERPT: AIR BASE 201, Niger – The 409th Air Expeditionary Group hosted 24 local vendors from the city of Agadez to participate in a Women's Bazaar on Dec. 2, which generated 7 million Central African Francs (\$11,350) in revenue for the local communities. ... "It helps build a strong relationship between us and the people of Agadez," (said U.S. Air Force Lt. Col. Barton Land, 724th Expeditionary Air Base Squadron and installation commander). "This initiative is also part of a greater effort to promote Women, Peace, and Security across the continent."

What makes this bazaar different is that it was organized and coordinated by the local Women's Association in Agadez, said U.S. Army Capt. Lindsey Martinez, 437th Civil Affairs Battalion, Alpha Company team leader. "It's so important to support small local businesses, and especially womenowned businesses because they often get unfairly excluded from the local marketplace," said Martinez. ARTICLE: "The Thing With Sexual Exploitation": Gender Representations and the Brazilian Military in an UN Peace Mission

EXCERPT: Based on thematic analysis of 40 semi-directive interviews, observation in Port-au-Prince and Brasilia and following a standpoint feminist and international political sociology approach, the article aims to explore gender representations among Brazilian peacekeepers. Using the Brazilian experience in Haiti as a case study, the article seeks to show how the UNSC agenda on Women, Peace and Security is appropriated by actors on the field. It argues that peacekeepers seek to reduce dissonance between the existing military understanding of gender and UN expectations.

FROM THE ARCHIVE: Malign Creativity: How Gender, Sex, and Lies are Weaponized Against Women Online (January 2021)

EXCERPT: Online gendered abuse and disinformation is a national security issue. In interviews with women targeted by Russian, Iranian, or Chinese state media, the research team found that gendered tropes formed the basis of disinformation and smear campaigns against them. This presents a democratic and national security challenge; as adversaries attempt to exploit widespread misogyny, women may be less likely to choose to participate in public life.
