Course Information

The purpose of this course is to provide students with an understanding of peace operations and stabilization activities, with a special area of emphasis (SAE) on current areas in conflict. The course explores the strategic framework for stabilization and peacekeeping success, the complexity of root causes of conflict and poverty, and closes with the interconnectedness of these global problems.

Course Outcomes

- 1. Understanding of the principles of stabilization and peacekeeping
- 2. Appreciation for the complexity of root causes pf poverty and conflict
- 3. Ability to identify best practices in peacekeeping domains and stabilization engagements

Instruction Methodology

The course is delivered in accordance with the adult learning model with a mix of Didactic and Socratic methods of instruction along with group work for synthesis and application. Each ELO is presented as a 3hr block that includes instruction (1hr), discussion (1hr), small group application (1hr). Breaks are conducted as required.
