ARTICLE: A reflection contribution by African women to peace and security agenda in the continent REPORTER: *By African Union (08.30.24)*

EXCERPT: On August 30, 2024, the African Union (AU) reaffirmed its commitment to enhancing women's leadership in peace and security as part of Agenda 2063. In recognition of African women's contributions to the women, peace, and security agenda, the AU and the United Nations are set to publish a commemorative book that highlights 20 women who have significantly advanced the goals of UN Security Council Resolution 1325. This initiative seeks to inspire young women engaged in mediation and peacebuilding by showcasing their remarkable stories.

EXCERPT: 1st Lt. Mackenzie Corcoran recently achieved the prestigious status of being "triple-tabbed," earning the Ranger, Sapper, and Jungle tabs, a significant accomplishment in the U.S. Army. Inspired by other female soldiers, Corcoran overcame self-doubt with the support and belief of her peers in the 29th Brigade Engineer Battalion at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii. Her journey began with the Jungle Operations Training Course and progressed through the demanding Sapper Leader Course and Ranger School. Despite the challenges, including physical exhaustion and mental hurdles, she persevered, becoming the 135th woman to graduate from Ranger School.

ARTICLE: Libya: We express our grave concern about the lack of women's full, equal and meaningful participation

REPORTER: By Permanent mission of France (08.20.24)

EXCERPT: On August 20, 2024, a coalition of Security Council members expressed deep concern over the insufficient participation of Libyan women in political processes during a joint press stakeout following a meeting on Libya. They also addressed alarming issues, such as shrinking civic space for women's rights organizations, gender-based violence, and inadequate legal protections for women and girls. Despite commitments for women's quotas in elections, recent electoral laws allocate only six seats for women in a 90-seat senate.

PUBLICATION: Military Humanitarianism in Southeast Asia, Through a Women, Peace and Security Lens

EXCERPT: The paper was published on August 20, 2024., explores the rising role of militaries in humanitarian efforts due to the increasing frequency and severity of natural disasters linked to climate change. While recognizing the operational strengths that military forces bring to disaster response, the paper stresses the necessity of incorporating a gender-sensitive approach, particularly through the Women, Peace, and Security (WPS) agenda. It addresses the increased vulnerability of women and girls to sexual and gender-based violence in such contexts and highlights the importance of understanding the specific risks they encounter.

EXCERPT During the Southern Accord 2024 exercise, U.S. Army personnel and Botswana Defence Force (BDF) members participated in a two-day Women, Peace and Security (WPS) workshop aimed at improving the integration of women into the military. Held on August 13-14, 2024, the workshop covered best practices for enhancing the role of women in military operations, addressing issues like sexual harassment and the need for tailored equipment. ARTICLE: Our Secure Future (OSF) Releases Findings on New Poll; Champions a Legislative Blueprint for Peace and Security in Asia

EXCERPT: Our Secure Future published findings from a global poll showing that 82% of women feel excluded from security discussions in their countries. The report underscores significant barriers to women's participation in peace and security efforts, particularly in South Korea, Japan, and China. Despite these challenges, 16 Asian countries, including Japan and the Philippines, have adopted National Action Plans on Women, Peace, and Security. Japan is leading the way by establishing a dedicated task force and a parliamentary caucus to enhance gender integration in security policies.

support. Policies require designated lactation spaces that are private, equipped, and convenient for nursing mothers. Additionally, various military services provide resources and counseling to assist service members during this time.

ARTICLE: They rape us before we can cross': Women, girls fleeing violence in Mali

EXCERPT: Women and girls fleeing violence in Mali have reported suffering sexual assaults by armed men, including Malian soldiers, at the border with Niger. Many have been raped at gunpoint while trying to escape from the violence and instability in Mali, exacerbated by ongoing conflicts with armed groups like the Islamic State in the Greater Sahara. REMARKS: Remarks at a UN Security Council Briefing on Women, Peace and Security

EXCERPT: Ambassador Lisa Carty, U.S. Representative to the Economic and Social Council, highlighted the importance of supporting communities during mission transitions with a focus on gender-responsive approaches. Carty stressed the need for adequate funding for Women, Peace and Security responsibilities and called for ongoing monitoring to ensure women's safety and rights. She urged for greater involvement of women's voices in planning processes and emphasized these as moral obligations to fulfill during critical transition periods.

SPEECH: Facing unacceptable prospects together

REPORTER: By UN Women (08.07.24)

EXCERPT: In her statement to the UN Security Council meeting on sustaining Women, Peace, and Security commitments amid accelerated peace operation drawdowns, Ms. Sima Bahous, Executive Director of UN Women, emphasized the vital importance of maintaining gender equality initiatives during these transitions. She warned that reducing peacekeeping forces in the face of escalating conflicts and increasing violence against women neglects on-the-ground realities and risks undoing progress made in gender equality. Bahous urged the Security Council to ensure women's involvement in transitions, integrate gender-responsive analysis from the outset, and allocate sufficient resources to uphold gender equality efforts.
